



The Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Denver Federal Center

The Master Site Plan Study is intended to establish a long-range vision for the 640-acre Denver Federal Center campus. An important part of the process is the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), which assesses potential environmental effects of various options and approaches to utilizing site resources.

Since the existing Federal Center Master Site Plan and EIS were completed in 1997, our community has grown and changed. It's time to take a new look at options and possibilities for the future. A new Master Site Plan and EIS will help the General Services Administration (GSA) accomplish this. Over the course of the 18- to 24-month study, the project team will produce a Draft EIS, a Final EIS and a Record of Decision.

Comments, suggestions and ideas will be gathered throughout the process by engaging federal tenants, community residents, businesses and organizations in a variety of ways, including public and small-group meetings where people can learn more and share their input.

What is an EIS?

An EIS is part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The NEPA process is required when projects use federal funds, occur within federal lands or require a federal permitting process. NEPA mandates that federal agencies


prepare in-depth studies of impacts of "major federal actions" that could affect the human or natural environment. The process is marked by several public comment periods during which the agency invites individuals, organizations and agencies to submit comments, ideas and suggestions.

The EIS ensures that high-quality environmental information is available to public officials and citizens before decisions

are made, and that agencies fully consider the environmental costs and benefits of their proposed actions before deciding to undertake those actions. The EIS facilitates public involvement and input in the decision-making process.

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Why is Public Involvement Important to an EIS?

Public involvement is an important requirement of NEPA and of the project planning process. It is essential for the preparation of an EIS and a useful tool for:

- ✘ Discovering alternatives to a proposed action
- ✘ Identifying significant impacts
- ✘ Eliminating insignificant issues
- ✘ Communicating information
- ✘ Consulting with agencies and organizations
- ✘ Soliciting public comments

What Areas does the EIS Evaluate?

This EIS evaluates impacts to resources including:

Land Use	Noise
Socioeconomics	Biological Resources
Transportation	Cultural Resources
Geology/Soils	Visual Resources
Hydrology and Water Quality	Public Utilities and Services
Air Quality	Hazardous Materials
