# Mission Statement

- Provide a safe and secure environment in a knowledgeable, professional, sophisticated and cost effective manner.
- Deliver integrated security and law enforcement services to all Federal Buildings, Courthouse, Border Stations and warehouse facilities.
- Allow Federal agencies and members of the public to conduct business without fear of violence, crime or disorder.

# FPS Responsibilities

- Visible, uniformed presence in major Federal Buildings
- Respond to and investigate criminal incidents and emergencies.
- Design, install and monitor security devices and systems.
- Building Security Assessments
- Crime Prevention and Security Awareness presentations.
- Continuous monitoring of thousands of building alarm systems through four communication and dispatch center (Mega Centers).
- Specialized Response – Natural disasters, civil disturbances, terrorist and criminal actions



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# FPS National Workload

- 8823 Facilities Protected
- 189,300 Calls for Services (Dispatches)
- 1,149 weapons seized / denied entry
- 881,171 Prohibited Items
- 3,458 Demonstrations and Disturbances
- 1,637,488 Alarm activations
- 6,398 Arrests on Federal Property
- 2,480 Building Security Assessments

# Current Regional Staffing

- Region 9 approximately 100 FPS FTE
- Region 10 approximately 55 FPS FTE
- Region 9 Contract Security Officers: approximately 1,336
- Region 10 Contract Security Officers: approximately 380

# Regional Facilities

- Region 9 – approximately 1050 protected facilities
  - 153 level 1, 717 level 2, 106 level 3, 75 level 4
- Region 10 – approximately 650 protected facilities
  - 281 level 1, 292 level 2, 41 level 3, 34 level 4



# Police Officer

- Armed, uniformed law enforcement officer
- Responds to crime, captures and detains subjects, conducts preliminary investigations and makes arrests
- Patrols assigned areas on foot, by motor vehicle or bicycle
- Provides special protection such as the National Political Conventions, high profile trials, VIP protection details



# Physical Security Specialist

- Conducts Building Security Assessments and develops action plans to identify and reduce vulnerabilities
- Conducts pre-lease security surveys/inspections of space
- Determines security systems or services for client agencies
- Promotes positive working relationships with customer agencies
- Acts as a liaison for Building Security Committee



# Inspector

- Hybrid position of Federal Police Officer, Criminal Investigator and Security Specialist
- Uniformed, armed law enforcement officer
- Responds to crimes, conducts investigations and makes arrests
- Conducts Building Security Assessments and recommends security systems for client agencies
  - Conducts preliminary lease inspections of space
  - Building Security Committee (BSC) Liaison
- Conducts agency training on a variety of topics such as workplace violence and crime prevention



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# Threat Management Branch

Manages the following programs:

- Physical Security Program (Federal Security Risk Management –FSRM)
- Contract Guard Program
- Criminal Investigations
  - Threat reduction/RTA/JTTF/Risk Assessment



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# Criminal Investigators

- Assigned as members of Joint Terrorism Task Forces
- Special Agents assigned to General Crimes Investigations
- Regional Intelligence Special Agent
  - Coordinates with FBI joint analytical center
  - Coordination with state, local and intelligence offices
  - Liaison with national JTTF

# Security Clearances

Security clearances are completed by FPS only for the following:

- GSA/PBS Childcare contracts
- Any PBS Awarded contract
- Other GSA contractors
- FPS cannot complete clearances for any other agency due to privacy restrictions

# 1995 DOJ Security Assessment

- April 19, 1995 Bombing of Murrah F.B. in Oklahoma City
- Developed Minimum Security Standards
- Security Levels
  - Level 1 - 10 or fewer employees, 2,500 or less sq. ft., low volume public
  - Level 2 – 11-150 employees, 2,550–80,000 sq. ft., moderate public
  - Level 3 – 151-450 employees, 80,000-150,00 sq. ft., moderate/high public contact
  - Level 4 – > 450 employees, >150,000 sq. ft., high volume public contact
  - Level 5 – Pentagon, CIA, etc.



# Interagency Security Committee

- Latest edition of Interagency Security Committee Security Design Criteria dated September 29, 2004
- Applies to all new construction, new courthouses and major modernization projects
- Security Standards for Leased Space dated February 10, 2005



# Building Security Surveys

- Department of Justice standards/ISC standards
- Recurring per schedule based on Security Level of Facility
- Identify Vulnerability
- Determines Standard Level
  - Identify security deficiencies

# Building Security Surveys

- Evaluate Existing Security Applications
  - Ensure minimum standards and requirements are met
- Submit Findings and Recommendations
- Present Recommendations to Building Security Committees (BSC's)

# Countermeasures

- Contract Security Officers
- X-Ray/ Magnetometer Screening
- CCTV
- Barriers
- Lighting
- CPTED
- IDS
- Access control/locks



# Building Security Committees

- Presents security deficiencies in the building
- Presents mandatory countermeasures to correct deficiencies

## Mandatory countermeasures

- Funded by FPS once it is requested in the budget cycle
  - Must also be shown as part of the Rent Est.
  - Can be funded by the SWA process if agencies want the countermeasure implemented before FPS receives funding through the budget cycle.
- Mandatory Countermeasures must be implemented



# Building Security Committees

- Presents optional countermeasures that would be above the standard
- Must have a majority approval by BSC members to implement optional countermeasures
  - Funded by tenants through Security Work Authorizations (SWA's)

# Building Security Committees

- Members of the BSC
  - Designated Official – Chairperson
  - FPS Representative
  - Member from each tenant agency
  - Frequency is based on the Building Security Level

# Building Security Committees

- Cautions/Benefits
- Contract Security Clearances
- Formal Memorandum of Understanding between PBS and FPS to work together

# Funding Authorities for FPS

- Revenue for Basic Security
- Revenue for Building Specific Costs
- Supplemental Allocations – Special circumstances such as 9-11 and National disasters
- Security Work Authorizations (SWA)

# FPS Revenue to Offset Budget Authority

FPS earns revenue two ways:

- Basic Security Rate calculated on assigned space in GSA inventory and approved by OMB
- Building Specific Operating Costs

# Basic Security Rate

- Charge for the service FPS provides to protect life and property and maintain law and order
- Basic security is based on a rate per square foot
- Basic security costs applied to all GSA's building inventory

# Basic Security Rate

# Services provided through Basic Security Rate

- Law enforcement on PBS-controlled property
  - Responding to calls for service and emergencies
  - Conducting Investigations
  - Arresting and charging suspects
- Megacenter Operations
  - Monitoring security alarms
  - Providing nationwide communication to L.E. and security personnel
- Criminal Intelligence and Investigations
  - Exchanging intelligence information with other L.E. agencies
  - Investigating crimes committed on GSA properties



# Basic Security Services (cont')

- Regional Threat Assessments
  - Assessing threats/developing mitigation plans
- Prorated share of protection Physical Security Initiatives
  - Providing security awareness training
  - Coordinating development of OEP's
  - Advising BSC's on recommendations
- administrative costs
  - Prorated share for above services



# Building Specific Operating Rates

Building specific costs that are not included in the Basic Security Rate

- Contract Security Guard Program
  - Controlling access to entrances and exits of specific buildings
- Security Systems
  - Purchase and installation of security devices – CCTV, alarms, x-ray/mag
- Prorated share of protection administrative costs
- Amortized equipment costs
  - The cost of the equipment for a security project amortized over 5 years of which 1/5 of the amortized cost is billed in the RENT.



# The GSA RENT Est. Is

- The process of identifying the building specific charges
- Provided 18 months in advance to agencies
- An estimate of the costs



# Security Work Authorizations

- Agency requests work to be accomplished by FPS.
- FPS provides scope of work and estimate including 15% fee (8% for FY08)
- All contracts, materials and timecards coded to SWA project number and STAR task code
- SWA's can only be obligated to their authorized level



# Security Work Authorizations

## Two types of SWA's

- “R” – costs recurring in nature
  - Term = 1 year or specific months
  - Divided by 4 quarters, each billed in advance
  - Can be “prepaid”
- “N” – Sets funding aside for up to 5 years
  - Services and small projects
  - Billed for expenses that occur plus 8%
